A Happy Ending

It was a Monday morning and Caroline and I were sitting in her front room surrounded by carrier bags and boxes containing a vast assortment of completed tops, half-completed tops, stray orphan blocks and fabric scraps. Caroline is our local Project Linus Co-ordinator here in Liverpool UK and we were trying to decide how best to deal with these donations - to just get them finished and out where they should be - giving comfort to a child.

I was making a small pile of things I thought I could manage myself when a delightful treasure emerged from the bundles. It was a fully completed little quilt featuring a wedding ring pattern in creamy yellow and grey and beautifully pieced and hand quilted. On turning it over I saw a label which read: "Made by Marion Edward Reeds, Houston, Texas. For Bob and Betty Reeds on their Golden Wedding Anniversary September 1993." There were also signatures written directly onto the backing: "Have a wonderful day, Marion." "Best Wishes, Charlotte." "With love and best wishes, Peter," "Love you, Karla" "Love, Alex." Also, it had been displayed at some point because there is a hanging sleeve.

It was obvious that if it was to become a Linus quilt the label would have to be removed and the signatures covered up somehow. This seemed like a great pity and so I offered to try and find the person who had made it and then take it from there.

A needle in a haystack? Not so. I am a member of a Facebook Quilting group called "Quiltville Open Studio" which currently has 77,723 members, many of whom are in the US but also in many other places around the world. I posted a picture of the quilt and a description of the label and said "Before it is given away, I thought I should try to find anyone of this family who would like to get it back. If you are that person please PM me."

Amazingly enough, within less than 24 hours Nancy Elliott Yetter from Houston posted that she had located a family with the right names. At the same time, I had a message from Susan Cohn LaCroix to say the same thing and that she was in touch with them. Wow, this was

amazing. Susan messaged and phoned to and fro doing the legwork and within a couple of days I was emailing with Marion Reeds, the maker of this quilt who now lives in Illinois.

Marion told me that the quilt was made for her in-laws who actually lived in Liverpool but that after her mother-in-law, Betty, died, her widower had given away much of her accumulated craft work and this quilt must have been part of that. We have no idea what happened to it afterwards until it turned up in the donated bundle for Linus. I didn't want to think that Linus had missed out on a quilt but equally Marion was keen to have the quilt back if it could be arranged. So we have a compromise. I have posted the quilt back to Marion and she is going to give me the postage's-worth of fabric to be used in a new quilt for Linus. Win win I think!

Sarah Jordan, from the charity, said: "We will use the money from the Helping Hands fund to buy materials for our volunteers, as we support several charities and agencies who have a real need for our blankets and we want to help our volunteers purchase the materials they need".

'We not only help those children who the blankets are donated to but our volunteers also benefit hugely from this project. Those who knit the blankets can often find themselves alone, or feeling less able than in previous years, and they are given a real sense of purpose when they can make something for a child in need.'

She added: "Donations, such as that from the Co-op, are vital in keeping the charity going."
