...a year in the life of.....



'Things have really been busy in Bridgend. As Area Co-ordinator I did have some reservations as to how our relatively new chapter would fair with me departing the country in February. With no plans to return until May, I had wondered if we would loose some of the traction which had built up since we were established in November 2021. I am delighted to say that I couldn't have been more wrong!

In addition to the National lottery funding we received in January we have also received funding from Arnold Clarke and also from the Town council, this has all helped as the calls for assistance continue to grow. Our reach now includes a number of local schools with children with additional needs and sensory rooms, and our numbers have continued to climb in line with that need. I am overwhelmed by our local stitchers and the way that they have continued to produce both a steady flow of finished quilts and also the way our members have stepped forward to complete bespoke works requested by local institutions. We have even had the son (year six) of one of our members who wanted to make a quilt for the sensory room of his school despite never sewn previously. What an amazing young man!

In March our local Mayor and Mayoress stepped in to present a National Lottery Community award to a local business which has firmly established itself as the beating heart of our group. Along with providing amazing discounts on fabrics to those making quilts for Linus, this business has become a central hub for picking up fabric and pre-cut fabric packs and for dropping off finished items. It also houses just the most amazingly active donation box for scraps.

A few days later they were active for us again, awarding a plaque to a local school who has been in receipt of a large number of our members wonderful masterpieces. We are so delighted to see the Lottery Funding being used and acknowledged in this way.

Month on month we have achieved and exceeded those targets we set ourselves in January. Whilst wishing for gorgeous summer weather, I am just hoping that our members don't get too distracted by the summer months and we can continued to donate quilts and blankets in the local community, where we see the need is real

A memory quilt And lots more !

In February the Warrington branch supplied a quantity of quilts and blankets to the refugees from Afghanistan based at Daresbury. This was in the local press and Jean Dickeson, our coordinator, received an email from a young woman, Connah, asking if Project Linus could make 3 memory quilts for her family.

I volunteered to do one quilt and the coordinator for Liverpool Caroline Fogell, also offered to help. Caroline and I travelled to Frodsham to meet with Connah. She sadly explained that her sister Ellie, aged 21, had obtained her degree last summer, 2021, was training to go into the Armed Forces and had suddenly and unexpectedly taken her own life in September. Connah asked if we could make three quilts, one for her eight-year-old son, her teenage brother and one for herself. There were 4 large boxes of clothes belonging to Ellie, and some of these could be made into quilts.

Using PJs, blouses, tee shirts and pants, I made a quilt for Connah and Caroline used jeans to make ones for the boys and added the back pockets of the jeans to the quilt tops, as requested, so that the boys could store things in them. We also made a cushion, from a brightly knitted jumper, 3 teddy bears from the garments and a card, which was signed by all the ladies from the Linus group.

Caroline and I delivered the quilts to Connah, she was so grateful and emotional and delighted with what we had made. **It** has been an honour and a privilege for us to do this. **Sue Aldridge Project Linus Warrington**

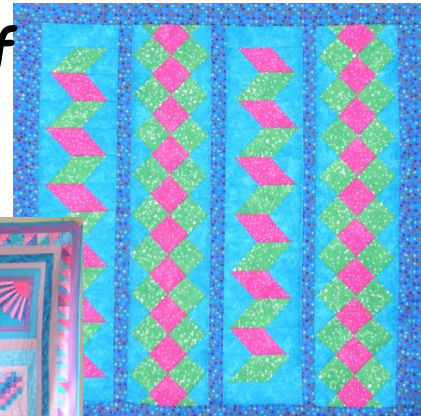
