STITCHING TOGETHER

A wonderful story PROJECT LINUS TAKES OFF IN NORTHERN IRELAND

TWO WOMEN

And boundless commitment all over the Province—as told by a local newspaper

Betty, Markethill and Aubreen at the heart of something special

MARKETHILL can never be accused of shirking responsibility towardspeople in need. Time and again it has come to the aid of the sick, the disabled, the disadvantaged or the distressed.

In the countdown to Christmas 2022 locals rose to the challenge yet again, offering support to babies, children and teenagers by providing hand-made hats, cardigans and blankets.

A key link in the start-to-finish chain is Aubreen Willis of Markethill & Willis Hardware shop fame. She has provided a drop-off point for those items, much to the delight of Project Linus Northern Ireland co-ordinator, Betty Fiddes.

And with Aubreen having confirmed her willingness to continue that all-important service, a delighted Betty told the Gazette, "I'd just like to take this opportunity to thank all those ladies who knit and sew blankets and quilts for us.

"Id like to thank Aubreen in particular for providing the local drop-off point for all the items produced in this area. We're so grateful to her for that — and the fact that she will be keeping this going." Highlighting the importance of this role, Betty continued, "As well as providing a drop-off point, Aubreen has lined up groups of women from all over Northern Ireland who knit and sew, so she really plays a major part in all of this." A number of women in Markethill and the surrounding area, who avail of the service she provides, produce items for Project Linus. Explaining how she first became involved in this UK-wide project Betty told the Gazette, "This all started as a result of me having been ill. As part of my recovery, I went to a quilt festival in Birmingham which is where I met ladies from Project Linus, which already was big in England and quite well known. Over here, though, it wasn't.



She continued, "I was asked if I'd be interested in becoming a coordinator for Northern Ireland and when I asked what that would entail I was told what it would mean me contacting some sewing or knitting groups, organising delivery of what they'd made to me so that I could check there were no flaws or possibly dangerous embellishments, and then distribute them to whoever needed them.

"It all started off with just a couple of local craft groups who agreed to make things. And then I started to go round Women's Institute meetings and giving out leaflets. A lot of ladies came on board and it has just grown from that. "There are now groups of women all over the country making quilts and knitting blankets, cardigans and hats for babies." Explaining her working relationship with Aubreen, Betty said, "I met Aubreen through her church group. She invited me to address them to explain what I was trying to do. I did, I'm pleased to say that they were very positive. They began making things and they've been doing that ever since.

"Aubreen has women making things down by Warrenpoint, all over County Tyrone, Markethill, Armagh – the whole area, in fact. She rings me, I go and collect what has been delivered to her, sort those things out, check them and then pass them on to the hospices, some of the hospitals' neo-natal units or anywhere else that we know needs them. I also give a lot to Baby Basics in Laurelvale to support the work they're doing to help mothers and babies.

Quilts are the main thing we distribute and these go to the Royal Victoria Hospital for Sick Children, the Intensive Care Unit and some of the other specialised wards. "I forwarded 40 quilts before Christmas and I've just received a letter back from the TLC (Total Leucocyte Count) unit thanking us for these.

"There are others we were going to send to the Children's Cancer Fund, but they told us that because the kids get so much at Christmas, it would be better if we waited until the end of January when they'd be better appreciated."

Betty admits to being "amazed" by the extent to which the whole thing



initially took off and has since mushroomed. "When I started this, it was just a small, purely local thing," she reflected. "But now we have people making quilts and blankets all over the country, which is wonderful.

"Throughout the Covid lockdown we were able to keep going, just getting on with quietly making blankets and quilts in the safety of our own homes and then delivering them to help other people.

"I think that was good for all of us because it kept us occupied and doing something worthwhile."
